From the desk of the D.D.G.M.

Greetings Brethren,

That Bright Morning Star

The following comes from the summons for the Sept 2008 meeting of Quatuor Coronati Lodge No. 2076:

The Bright Morning Star.

(extracts from Miscellanea Latomorum. sertes II, Vol. 31, pp 1-4)

It is argued that this reference to "that Bright Morning Star" is an allusion to the Founder of Christianity, and as such should never have been included in, or retained in, ritual of an Association professing entire freedom from denominational creed or dogma, outside of the simple basic belief in the existence of a Supreme Being. This attitude has unfortunately been bolstered up by a frequent misquotation of the wording, the phrase "whose rising brings peace and tranquility" being often rendered as "peace and salvation," which is erroneous and decidedly mischievous.

As a symbol, the Morning Star is indeed most appropriate to the ceremonial incident just previously enacted; so apt, in fact, that it may be confidently asserted that no other symbol could be found which would so perfectly fit the circumstances of the case. Astronomically the Morning Star is the herald of the dawning of a new day, just as its opposite, the Evening Star, presages the coming of night. The latter foretells the dying of another day, the approach of the time when man can no longer work; when darkness covers the face of the earth. Darkness has ever been associated with evil, and in its sombre unknown possibilities is a fitting emblem of death. On the other hand, the rising Morning Star brings joy and gladness with its promise of yet another day, of light once more, in which man may work and renew his association with his fellow-man in business or in pleasure. In short, with the new-born day, man rises to a new life. What more fitting symbol, then, than this of the promise of new life after death or the immortality of the soul.

What's That All About?

Why does Freemasonry forbid brethren to ask their friends to become Masons?

One of the fundamental concepts of Freemasonry is that application for membership must be wholly a voluntary act. A man must seek for himself and join "of my own free will and accord." Under no other formula can men unite brethren of a thousand religious and political beliefs. Under no more constricting act could Freemasonry accomplish her only end, the building of character among men. Men who become members of a Masonic lodge for any other reason than their own desires can neither receive nor give to others the advantages of a wholly voluntary association. Freemasonry is bigger than any man; the man must seek its blessings; it never seeks the man.

What Masonic penalties are enforced?

The only penalties known to Freemasonry are reprimand; definite suspension from membership; indefinite suspension from membership; expulsion from the Fraternity. To these must be added that intangible penalty which comes to any one who loses all or any part of his reputation. Other penalties suggested in the ritual are wholly symbolic - are not now and never have been enforced. They were legal punishments in the middle ages, designed with special reference to the religious beliefs of the time that an incomplete body could not "rise from the dead"; that a body buried in un-consecrated ground (as between high and low water mark) could not ascend into heaven. Some Grand Lodges offer an interpretation of the ritualistic penalties, in order to be sure the initiate understands the symbolic character of these otherwise difficult phrases.

What is a dispensation?



A permission from the Grand Master to do certain things otherwise forbidden by law. A Grand Master may grant a dispensation to shorten the time between degrees, to admit more than the statutory number of candidates at one communication, to form a new lodge, etc. In general he cannot give a dispensation that sets aside either the laws of the Grind Lodge or the by-laws of a particular lodge, except as set forth in the Book of the Law, Constitutions or Code of the Grand Lodge. In some Grand Lodges the Grand Master's power is so great that he can set aside almost any law, but such use of power is rarely attempted and is usually frowned upon by Grand Lodges.

Why is it un-Masonic to disclose how one has balloted?

In all Grand Jurisdictions the ballot on candidates is secret and inviolable. It is considered un-Masonic, and in most Grand Jurisdictions is against Masonic law, for any brother to divulge how he has balloted or will ballot on any candidate. Masters are instructed strictly to adhere to this requirement. Peace and harmony are the foundations of all Masonic meetings. For Brother A to learn that Brother B has balloted against his friend disrupt that peace and harmony. The rejection of a candidate is a blow to him who has applied. If everyone knew who had cast the black ball



the rejected man might speedily learn, and cause friction in the profane world would then have come out of a Masonic lodge.

A ballot is sometimes immediately retaken, because the appearance of a single black ball may be an error; the ball may have been cast by mistake. If the single black ball appears the second time, presumably it was intentionally cast.

Ballots differ in different Jurisdictions. In some a "collective ballot" may be taken on several candidates at once; if a black ball appears, each name is then balloted on separately. In others, a "multiple ballot box" is used, with a compartment for each name which is printed above it. In still others, each name is balloted on separately from the beginning. In all Grand Jurisdictions, ballots are secret, inviolable and regarded as a cornerstone on which the fraternity is erected.

Why is a certain square in Masonry termed an "Oblong Square"?

An oblong square has its greatest length from east to west, its breadth from north to south.

During the Solomon era the world was supposed to have that oblong form. On a map of the world, inscribe an oblong figure whose boundary lines circumscribe and include that portion known to be inhabited in the days of Solomon; these lines, running a short distance north and south of the Mediterranean Sea, and extending from Spain in the west to Asia Minor in the east, form an oblong square, including the southern shore of Europe, the northern shore of Africa, and the western district of Asia, the length of the parallelogram being about sixty degrees from east to west, and its breadth being about twenty degrees from north to south.

This oblong square enclosing-the whole of what was then supposed to be the habitable globe, represents what is symbolically said to be the form of the lodge.

"Oblong square" has been objected to by purists as a contradiction in terms; they insist that an oblong is a rectangle with unequal sides and perpendiculars while a square is a rectangle with equal sides and perpendiculars. The word "square" did not originally denote a figure with four equal sides, but any figure which had right angles at all four corners. Later "square" came to mean not only "right angled" but a figure enclosed by four equal length lines any adjoining two of which formed a right angle. "Oblong square" then, meant anciently what "oblong" (noun) means today.

What are the "beasts of the field"?

Superstition in the Middle Ages maintained that a man's body must be buried while perfect if his soul was to go to heaven. Hence, the destroyed (eaten) flesh of a body prevented resurrection. "Beasts of the field" are not the familiar horses and cows, but the wild beasts of Leviticus 26:22, "I will also send wild beasts among you," etc. These are bears, wild bulls, hyenas, jackals, leopards and wolves - all Old Testament animals.

Where and how may I discover the Lost Word?

Nowhere and in no way. In other rites you r receive other substitutes but the real Lost Word, never. This is the unanswerable question.



The Lost Word is the most abstruse and most important symbol of the Fraternity; few if any are less understood. The Lost Word is not a syllable or several syllables; "word" is here used as John used it: "In the beginning was the Word, the Word was with God, and the Word was G< The Lost Word is not discovered in Freemason Masons are given a substitute. Of the Lost Word it has been written (*Introduction to Freemasonry*) "Never may we find it here. You shall gaze through microscope and telescope and catch no sight of its shadow. You shall travel many lands and- far and see it not. You shall listen to all the words of the_tongues which all men have ever spoken and will speak - the Lost Word is not heard. Were it but a word, how easy to invent another! But is not a word but *The Word*, the great secret, the unknowableness which the Great Architect sets before his children, a will-o'-the-wisp to follow, a pot of gold at the end of a rainbow. Never here is it to be found, but the search for it is the reason for life.

Masonic Authors Richard Sands



Past Grand Master of Masons in Michigan. The author of several articles and stories on Freemasonry. Bro. Richard Sands also is board member of Bonisteel Masonic Library.

He was raised a Master Mason in Golden Rule Lodge *159, Ann Arbor, on March 12, 1964, and served his lodge as Worshipful Master in 1971 and later as Intender and as Lodge Education Officer from 1974 through 1977. He is a dual member of Livingston Lodge *76 in Pinckney.



He became active in the Grand Lodge of Michigan serving on the Masonic Service and Education Committee in 1971-78, chairing that committee from 1972-77. During his tenure as chairman, the committee developed the Lodge Educational System including the Intender Plan, began the Warden's Meeting at Grand Lodge, held Leadership Training Sessions in every District and instituted the educational newsletter "From Point-to-Pointe," which later became the official Grand Lodge publication. During his chairmanship, the Committee developed and published the Lodge Education Manual, the Intender Handbook, and Planning for The East, a leadership training guide. He was the Editor of "From Point-to-Pointe" for the first three years, building the circulation to 30,000 inside and outside the State of Michigan, before it was taken over by Grand Lodge. He became Michigan's Most Worshipful Grand Master in 1985.

He has been a very active Scottish Rite Mason, receiving the 32° on November 9, 1974, serving as Thrice Potent Master of the Detroit Lodge of Perfection in 1981-82, was elected to the Board of Trustees from 1983 through 1985, and serving as Chancellor of Detroit Consistory in 1986-87. He was coroneted a 33° on August 29, 1989.

Brother Sands is also a York Rite Mason, receiving the Royal Arch Degree in Washtenaw Chapter *6, RAM on April 4, 1965, made a Cryptic Mason on April 4, 1966 in Ann Arbor Council *86, Royal & Select Masters and received his Knight Templar (Order of the Temple) on April 29, 1969. He is a member of York Rite College *3 in Jackson and received the Order of the Purple Cross in 1986.

He is a member of St. Clement Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine and is its current Prelate, a member of Grand Master's Council A, Allied Masonic Degrees, Great Chiefs Council *0, Knight Masons, Oxford Lodge *1, Ark Mariners, a Fellow of the Grand College of Rite and a member of the Royal Order of Scotland. He is a Prophet in Zal Gaz Grotto, M.O.V.P.E.R., Ann Arbor, a Noble in Moslem Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S. in Detroit and a member of Washtenaw Chapter *490, High Twelve International.

He is a member and Fellow of the Philalethes Society and received its coveted Certificate of Literature Award in 1981, for his paper on "Freemasonry and the Royal Society" published in the Philalethes Magazine.

He is a member of Missouri Lodge of Research, the Iowa Lodge of Research, the Illinois Lodge of Research, and the Correspondence Circle of Quatuor Coronati Lodge #2076. He is author of several articles on Freemasonry and has contributed much to the "Michigan Masonic Manual," a leadership training manual for the Lodge Officers in Michigan.

He has received innumerable honours, including twelve honorary memberships in Masonic Lodges in Michigan and Ohio, the coveted Legion of Honour in the Order of DeMolay, the Grand Cross of Color Order of Job's Daughters. He was chosen Prophet of the Year in 1988 by the Supreme Council, M.O.V.P.E.R., Grottoes of North America.

Chinese New Year - Year of the Dragon

Gung Hei Fat Choy

The Chinese New Year day is on January 23rd, 2012. Because this is a new moon day, it is the first day of the first Chinese lunar month in the Chinese Lunar Calendar system. The traditional New Year's celebration will end on the 15th day of the lunar month.

Chinese New Year is celebrated round the globe including countries like Singapore, Indonesia, Mainland China, Macau, Hong Kong, Malaysia, Taiwan, and Vietnam. Festivities also take place in different countries with major Chinese ethnic populations. Though Chinese New Year is celebrated with pomp and glory in Japan, Cambodia and Philippines, yet it is not a public holiday there.

According to legend, in ancient China, the Nián was a man-eating beast from the mountains (in other versions from under the sea), that came out every 12 months somewhere close to winter to prey on humans. The people later believed that the Nián was sensitive to loud noises and the colour red, so they scared it away with explosions, fireworks and the liberal use of the colour red. These customs led to the first New Year celebrations. Guò nián, which means 'to celebrate the new year', literally means 'the passover of the Nián'.

This year is the Year of the Dragon, the most auspicious animal as per the Chinese zodiac. People born in the Year of the Dragon (1964, 1976, 1988, 2000) exhibit characteristics such as -

- Charismatic
- Free spirited
- Smart and witty
- Originality

- Innovative
- Self-assured
- Flexible
- Passionate
- Brave
- Unanticipated
- Scrutinizing
- Generous

However, they possess a couple of negative characteristics as well. For instance, they crave for attention and are egoistical by nature. They aren't modest and have a bossy temperament. Their general tendency is to dominate others. They detest unsolicited advice and may be insensitive and tactless to their partners.



Dragons are blessed with good health. The only thing that bothers them is stressful situations. At work, dragons are pretty imaginative and prefer taking a radical approach towards their work.

Traditionally, Red envelopes or red packets are passed out during the Chinese New Year's celebrations, from married couples or the elderly to unmarried juniors. It is also common for adults or young couples to give red packets to children. Red packets are also known as the money used to suppress or put down the evil spirit, during this period. Red packets almost always contain money, usually varying from a couple of dollars to several hundred. Per custom, the amount of money in the red packets should be of even numbers, as odd numbers are associated with cash given during funerals.





Gung Hei Fat Choy! - Translated verbatim, the greeting is "congratulations on prospering in money." Notice that the greeting is congratulatory. This is something native speakers may not be aware of. The American Heritage Dictionary defines a congratulation as an expression of an acknowledgment of something already achieved. Literally, Gung Hei Fat Choy is more than just a wish or desire, or a hope or belief. It presupposes that you already have it made, for which congratulations are due.

I Always Wondered Where They'd Gone To!

IT COULD have been a plot twist from The Da Vinci Code when workers unearthed a pile of bones under heavy stone slabs.

No-one knew why the skeletons were there in the central aisle of the 15th century Rosslyn Chapel, which according to legend is the last resting place of ancient knights and even older holy relics.

But archaeologists now believe the skeletons were placed there when the chapel was abandoned during the Reformation, in the 17th century, by local people who wanted to bury their relatives on consecrated ground. They lay under the stone for more than three centuries until the slabs were lifted two years ago.

The archaeological team has now released the first pictures of the skeletons in their resting place. Tests are still under way to accurately date the findings.

Colin Glynne-Percy, director of the Rosslyn Chapel Trust, said: "During excavation works to install a new heating system in the chapel, archaeologists found a number of bones just beneath the slabs. Below that, they came across a second skeleton that was fully intact."

Lindsay Dunbar, from Loanhead-based AOC Archaeology Group, employed to monitor the present conservation project at Rosslyn, was one of those who discovered the bones while extending an old heating duct. "We believe that the first set of bones had been disturbed by workers putting in the original duct, some time around the beginning of the 20th century," she said.

"The bones at the higher level have been removed and are being examined before being re-interred. A small sample has been taken from the second skeleton, which was recorded and left in situ."

It is believed there were three burials, although experts can't be sure because the bones have been scattered over a large area.

"Once we get a full human bone report then hopefully the specialist will be able to give us an exact number of individuals," said Dunbar.

Rosslyn chapel, made famous by its inclusion in Dan Brown's best-selling The Da Vinci Code, had been in operation for only about 150 years when, in 1592, its altar was burned and its statues smashed as "a house and monument of idolatrie." The chapel was abandoned and left to rot for almost 300 years until, in 1862, it was rededicated by the Bishop of Edinburgh.

During their research into the chapel, the archaeologists uncovered anecdotal stories of locals using the chapel as an unofficial cemetery in the period when the church wasn't in use.

"People were coming in, lifting up the slabs and putting bodies there," said Dunbar. "We suspect the bones date from that period."

Carbon dating and other tests being carried out on the bones should be completed next year.



"Hopefully, we should be able to determine a little bit of information such as age, sex and what era," said Glynne-Percy.

"Beyond that we shall just have to wait and see what information they can extract."

Rosslyn Chapel, in Midlothian, is awash with legend and mystery. As well as being linked to the Knights Templar, in 1998 anthropologist Dr Keith Laidler claimed that Christ's head was buried under the Scottish chapel.

The suggestion was that the Knights Templar, members of a religious military order born out of the first crusade, dug up the head in Jerusalem and carried it through France to Scotland.

It has also been claimed that the church, built in 1446 by Sir William St Clair, was the hiding place of the Holy Grail. This was the subject of Dan Brown's book, which was made into a film starring Tom Hanks in which the plot came to the conclusion that the Holy Grail was not an object but descendants stretching back to the relationship between Jesus Christ and Mary Magdalene.

Another Rosslyn legend is that the chapel is the burial place of the St Clair Knights, which could provide a tantalising theory as to the identity of the skeletons.

The skeletons are the most spectacular of a number of discoveries made at Rosslyn since the conservation project began in 2009. They include more bone fragments in the chapel grounds, a stone buttress in the roof containing a hidden stone beehive used for producing honey and another roof slab with hearts carved on to its inward-facing edge.

The work at Rosslyn, to install the new heating system, is part of a £9 million conservation project that has already seen the refurbishment of the roof and renovation of many of the stained-glass windows and the organ.

Work is expected to be completed in 2013.

Brethren,

I publish papers in this section and occasionally under separate cover. These papers are taken from Masonic sources that are available to the general public. I must point out that until VERY recently, truth and fact were of passing importance to many Masonic writers. The concepts of checking and recording the source of facts are a relatively new innovation. The most glaring examples of this are the Templar and Rosslyn stories. However, even noted respected authors can get it wrong. Very few - exceedingly few - authors have the time let alone the resources to source out their information. They rely on someone else's work. For example - we know the mother Grand Lodge was started in 1717. Unless you personally have seen the actual primary documents that substantiate this fact - the possibility exists, however small, that the information is wrong. Once someone has published a false fact, whether intentionally or un-intentionally, that fact takes on a life of its own and is referenced in subsequent publications as an established truth.

After the universally recognised research lodge Ars Quator Coronati presents a paper, its members debate the paper. Those that agree or disagree state their reasons why. So even heavily researched papers have noted researchers arguing for and against.

Henry Coils and Bernard Jones are excellent researchers and authors, however, time and subsequent research has turned up occasional inaccuracies in their work.

At your initiation, you were taught to be cautious.

The above is a comment on Masonic texts in general and should not be construed in any way as a reflection on the following paper.

Constitutions and Charges

A few years after the 1717 formation of the Premier Grand Lodge in London, the then Grand Master, George Payne, who served the Grand Lodge two separate times as Grand Master, 1718 and 1720, ordered that the Masons should bring to the next Annual Communication all the old writings they had from the Lodges before the Grand Lodge was formed. Our early Brethren brought all the old records and documents that survived to the next annual communication, which were given to Rev. Brother James Anderson who was charged to digest all the information and draft a new set of rules and



regulations for the consideration of the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge. I mention about the old records that survived, because there is documentation that many Masons destroyed many documents rather than have them appear in a printed book produced by anyone, even the newly formed Grand Lodge. Not all was harmonious within the Premiere Grand Lodge at the time.

Brother John Noorthouck¹ in commenting on a book titled 'The Use and Abuse of Freemasonry' written by our former Brother George Smith² in 1783 mentions about Grand Master Payne's order to bring the old documents to the Grand Lodge: "Indeed, the temptations of authorship have effected a strange revolution of sentiments since the year 1720, when even ancient manuscripts were destroyed, to prevent their appearance in a printed book of Constitutions!" Evidently many of our early Brethren were very adamant that nothing about Masonry should be collected and printed. Freemasonry, however, is indebted to the Masons who did bring in what they had of the written laws of Masonry in the form of those old documents, because through them Speculative Masonry has learned and continues to learn a great deal.

In any event the result of the gathering of the 'old' Masonic documents brought to the Grand Lodge by our early Brethren is what we now know as Anderson's Constitutions of 1723. There were also editions that followed. We're just years away from the 300th anniversary of the founding of the Premiere Grand Lodge, (2017) and the writing of the Constitutions for the Grand Lodge of England. While Anderson's Constitutions are not Landmarks, they do precede the list of Landmarks compiled by Brother Albert Mackey in 1858, and are important to Masonry and to Masons.³

I'm told that in the Grand Jurisdictions of Canada each Constituent Lodge has the Charges of Anderson's Constitutions read at the making of every Mason in the Lodge, and, in addition, these Charges are read in each Lodge annually, so that all are familiar with them. I like the tradition of reading Anderson's Constitutions on a regular basis, and it might be a good idea to also read Mackey's list of 25 Landmarks.

These Charges can be read in the Little Masonic Library, which is available in most Lodge libraries, and Freemasons for Dummies, which was a selection for the Minnesota Masonic Book Club in November 2005. Mackey's list of Landmarks is available to read in many places, one of the easiest places to read many old documents is on the Internet at sites such as Phoenix Masonry at www.phoenixmasonry.org, and the Grand Lodge of British Columbia and the Yukon at http://www.freemasonry.bcy.ca/sitemap.html. Another good thing to do is read them in Mackey's Jurisprudence of Freemasonry. Reading old documents such as the Old Manuscripts, Anderson's Constitutions, Mackey's Landmarks, and the Masonic Laws of your own Grand Lodge is a very interesting journey into Masonic learning.

In the Masonic Concordance of the Holy Bible it mentions something that, to me, is interesting about the word 'Neighbour.' About that word it refers the reader to Anderson's Constitutions where in section 6 "Of Behaviour," and article 5 "Behaviour at Home and in your Neighbourhood," it says in part: "You are to act as becomes a moral and wise man; particularly, not to let your family; friends and neighbours know the concerns of the Lodge." The good reason for this is because the Lodge resembles a family, and

Brother Noorthouck is the one who saw fit to report Brother Preston to the Master for having organized a procession to St. Dunstan's Church without a dispensation. [a) Denslow's 10,000 famous Freemasons.] This led to his suspension / expulsion and the formation of the Grand Lodge of England South of the River Trent. Noorthouck himself was also later expelled, but both were later reinstated, and while Noorthouck and Preston obviously were at odds Denslow suggests that possibly they may have reconciled, as Noorthouck became a member of Preston's Grand Chapter of Harodim. Reading about Noorthouck and Preston is an interesting study into how animosity of two Masons can get out of hand. You can begin reading about it at; http://www.masonicdictionary/preston.html Also in the latest issue of the Philalethes (Fall 2009) there is an excellent article on Preston that mentions Preston and Noorthouck by our good Brother and Masonic scholar Robert G. Davis of Guthrie, OK I mention 'former' because in 1785 Captain George Smith was expelled from Masonry for 'uttering an instrument purported to be a certificate of the Grand Lodge recommending two distressed Brothers.'

because of that there are things the Masonic family would like to keep private, because those things concern no one else.¹

Andersons Constitutions is not the only place you will find the admonition of keeping private the goings on and business of a Masonic Lodge. Many if not all of the 'Old Constitutions' "have the charge that "every Mason shall keep true counsel of Lodge and Chamber' (see Sloane Manuscript, No. 3848). This is enlarged in the Andersonian Charges, of 1722 thus: 'You are not to let your family, friends and neighbours know the concerns of the Lodge' (Constitutions, 1723, page 55). However loquacious a Freemason may be in the natural confidence of neighbourhood intercourse, he must be reserved in all that relates to the esoteric concerns of Freemasonry."²

There are three copies of what Mackey calls the 'Old Manuscripts" that have the name of 'Sloane;' so named because they were once the property of Sir Hans Sloane, but which now can all be found in the British Museum. The first Sloane Manuscript (circa 1646) is number 3848, and is one of the most complete copies extant of the 'Old Constitutions.' The second Sloane Manuscript (circa 1659) is number 3323, and the third Sloane Manuscript, (date of this manuscript is unknown but thought from 1640 to 1700; some scholars think it should be dated around the beginning of the 18th century,) is number 3329. More can be read about these important Manuscripts in Mackey's Encyclopaedia of Freemasonry, and in Mackey's 7-volume set of the History of Freemasonry. Many Lodges will have one or more sets of this work in their Lodge library. Otherwise they can still be found through sellers of used Masonic Books; one of my favourite sources is Brother Harold Davidson, founder of the Billings Masonic Library and Librarian of The Philalethes Society; Brother Harold can be reached at brodave@wtp.net.

It is difficult to legislate and enforce certain behaviours among people, Freemasonry included. However, the 'old Charges', and The Charges approved by the Premiere Grand Lodge in 1722, and which make up an important part of Anderson's Constitutions, attempt to do just that. Section 6 and all its articles (1 - 6) deal specifically with a Speculative Mason's behaviour both within and without the Lodge. This section of Anderson's Constitutions might make an interesting topic for a presentation by the Lodge Education Officer.

Inwood, in his sermon on 'Union Amongst Masons' says: 'To defame our Brother, or suffer him to be defamed, without interesting ourselves for the preservation of his name and character, there is scarcely the shadow of an excuse to be formed. Defamation is always wicked. Slander and evil speaking are the pests of civil society, are the disgrace of every degree of religious profession, are the poisonous bane of all brotherly love.'
